










Still awake?

Benjamin von Stuckrad-Barre

"Still awake?" is a moral portrait of our time, a typical Stuckrad-Barre. Literally brilliant, humorous and uncompromising, this novel tells of power structures and abuse of power, courage and human abysses.

"Exactly, I went on, perhaps with a somewhat uncomfortable triumph, you don't want that and you shouldn't have to, under absolutely no circumstances should you see your boss naked, and to prevent that as a boss is really not that difficult: Leave your pants on, it's simple, they stay on, no matter what the situation or mood, even if employees are nearby. "

Berlin: A young woman talks about her new job at a major television station, her new boss, her new life. She seems happy, inspired, hopeful, it sounds good. Too good?

Meanwhile, in Los Angeles, a certain world is coming to an end. A man who brags that being a celebrity is anything to go by with women becomes President of the United States. In the garden of the legendary »Chateau Marmont«, this nighttime playground for spoiled Hollywood kids of all ages, an illustrious gang is passing the time on the run from reality. The narrator is here too – and Rose McGowan, the actress who's said to have gotten kind of tiring lately.

Shortly thereafter, the Weinstein scandal shook Hollywood, and Rose McGowan was one of the first women to publicly disclose sexual harassment by the film producer, who had been courted by all of Hollywood. Rose disappears, but she leaves the narrator with a cryptic message - or is it an errand? Why is she turning to him of all people?

From Hollywood, the #MeToo movement spread around the world. But the old power structures are more resistant than one might think in the initial euphoria.

Back in Berlin, the narrator no longer finds himself just a deckchair observer, but now an actor in the middle of a confusing event that plunges him into a deep personal conflict.




Afternoons

They are short stories about the things that change our lives, about coincidences, wrong decisions and the fleeting nature of happiness. Schirach tells of the loneliness of people, of art, literature, film, and always of love.


Love is fierce



The Roleder couple moves to an uninhabited island in the middle of a large lake. It is an escape inward, from the city and reality. Along for the ride is their son Hans, who finds a new home on the island. And so much more. Because as time goes by, the shy boy seems to virtually grow together with the island, the trees, the foliage, the moss and the rocks. Hans becomes the king of the island. Until, with the decision of the school authorities, reality breaks into his little big dream world and separates him from the island and his parents. It is the beginning of an arduous odyssey, guided at first by the merciless institutions of the state and finally by the one great, throbbing wish: to return to his island, to the longed-for solitude in the shadow of the world. But how will the island, how will his parents receive him? Dirk Gieselmann's debut is a fascinating literary study of an island life and tells of the longing for solitude in a society that never leaves the individual alone, for better or for worse. Blind and over ninety years old, Klara begins to record her memories on cassette. In search of the person she once was, she entrusts the tapes with a secret that not even her children know about. Is her family ready for the true story of her life?

Seventy years earlier: Young Klara is overjoyed. In the midst of the Great Depression of 1929, she gets a job as a teacher in a children's home in Oranienbaum. When Tolla, a one-year-old girl, is dropped off there one day, Klara immediately feels a strong bond with him. But soon the economic situation of the home comes to a head. Klara, who now runs the home, seeks the proximity of the new National Socialist rulers in the hope of salvation. Too late, she realizes with whom she has become involved. The National Socialists want to turn the home into a training center for young women. Under the swastika flag and the constant visits of Nazi officials, Klara is suddenly in danger herself: Tolla, the orphan girl who now lives at Klara's side like a daughter, is of Jewish origin.

Suspenseful, clever, humorous: The new atmospheric investigative crime series about Commissario Vito Grassi from Liguria.


Haunted by a feeling of loneliness, Commissario Vito Grassi says good-bye to life and career in his hometown Rome. After inheriting a remote rustico not far from Cinque Terre National Park, he has himself transferred to Liguria. Upon arrival he encounters mysterious Toni, his father's gardener, who refuses to leave the rustico. Also both his new boss Lilia Feltrinelli and new partner Marta Ricci manage to irritate him right from the start. Alas, Commissario Grassi has no time to adjust, as on his very first day, a body is found in a tunnel by the sea – and this is just the beginning. The steep cliffs, the narrow streets of the old villages and the deep blue of the Ligurian Sea only slowly begin to reveal their dark secrets. Pressure rises, as Grassi investigates with a little help of the three new women in his life.

ITALIAN FAREWELLS is the first case for Commissario Vito Grassi and Volume 1 of Andrea Bonetto's Crime Series set on the spectacular Ligurian Riviera.
